

PALS program serves up "more than a meal" to furry friends

hen Debora began receiving meals from Ypsilanti Meals on Wheels, she was relieved to know that nutritious food would be delivered right to her door. She was just as excited to learn that her American bulldog, Karma, could receive food, too.

YMOW's Pets Assisting the Lives of Seniors (PALS) program offers food, cat litter, grooming and veterinary care for the furry friends of YMOW clients. In partnership with the Humane Society of Huron Valley, PALS provides care and transportation, which can be difficult if not impossible for a pet owner who no longer drives.

A requirement of the PALS program is that all pets are spayed or neutered. So before receiving meals, Karma needed a visit to the vet. That visit likely saved her life. Her initial examination revealed several conditions in need of attention, including heartworm, mammary tumors and several teeth that were cracked or broken

"She's doing much better,"
Debora said of her beloved
companion, who is now
spayed and receiving treatment for heartworm. Karma
also is receiving food, which
leaves more money for Debora to care for herself as she
continues cancer treatments.

Like so many seniors with pets, Debora said she was prepared to cut back on her own needs to care for Karma. A recent study by Meals on

Wheels America shows that nearly 30 percent of clients have sacrificed some form of personal care in order to provide for their pets.

In the past Debora has cashed in insurance policies to care for her beloved pets. But this time, she didn't have to. "It has helped me financially, and it relieves stress," she said of the support she receives from YMOW and HSHV.

Having her dog home with her and getting healthier each day makes everything a little better. She relies on Karma for companionship, affection and entertainment.

"She's so comical," Debora said. "She cracks me up."

If laughter is the best medicine, Debora's prescription is full, thanks to Karma and the care she receives through PALS.

Carletta packages every meal with an extra helping of care

arletta Richardson's job in the Michigan Medicine kitchen is about more than putting food on her table. It's about putting food on the tables of some of her most vulnerable senior neighbors.

"I care about every senior. I just care about other people," said Carletta.

A member of the Michigan Medicine team since 1988, Carletta has worked in nearly every part of the kitchen. When presented in 2016 with the opportunity to join the team responsible for preparing and packaging meals for Meals on Wheels, she took it.

"I didn't even have to hesitate," Carletta said.

In her current role, Carletta helps to portion and package meals for hundreds of seniors served by Ann Arbor and Ypsilanti Meals on Wheels. It means her days start early.

"I start work each day at 5 a.m.," she said.

Whether she's counting celery sticks or scooping up macaroni and cheese, Carletta said she prepares each and every tray and bag as if she's delivering it to her own family.



"I really enjoy it because I'm doing it for other peoples' parents," she said. "I just want the people to be happy with what they're receiving."

Working with a great team makes what could be a tough job enjoyable, Carletta said.

"It's hard if you want to make it hard," she said. But Carletta said she chooses to find joy and purpose in everything she does, because she knows her work isn't just about her.

"It's all about the community, the people," she said.

Care on Wheels makes home more comfortable

ousehold tasks that once were simple can become difficult and even dangerous for older adults. Our Care on Wheels program, launched in 2021, is designed to keep seniors safe and their homes clean.



Through a partnership with Seniors Helping Seniors of Ypsilanti, we are currently providing 10 seniors with light housekeeping and have provided more than 115 hours of assistance as of February 11.

A hidden benefit of this service is the socialization it provides. Many clients report that they enjoy their visits from their Seniors Helping Seniors caregiver just as much as they enjoy their clean home.

Care on Wheels was funded through an innovations grant from United Way of Washtenaw County and has been awarded a planning grant from the Ann Arbor Area Community Foundation's Aging Justice program.

YMOW staff is working hard to secure funding to continue this important service, and to offer it to more of our homebound senior neighbors.

her route. "I look forward to going to work," said Richele, who called her job at YMOW "the best job I've ever had."


"It's not just a food delivery service. It's a lifeline. It's about community. It's just about being there," she said.
