



Precautions cause peak in demand for help

Access to food was difficult for Ken even before COVID-19. But with the added risks caused by the virus, his occasional trek to the corner store wasn't just cumbersome and expensive, it became dangerous.

When Ken called Ypsilanti Meals on Wheels for help, he was told he would have to wait for a space to open up before he could begin receiving meals. He was one of a few dozen people on the waiting list – the first that YMOW had seen in several years.

But thanks to the donation of a van by Toyota Motors North America and grant assistance from Meals on Wheels America, Ken's wait, and the wait of others, was shorter than expected. Ken now has meals delivered to his door – meals that do much more than fill his stomach. Ken said that knock on his door each Monday, Wednesday and Friday lifts his spirits. "I actually feel a little vibrant. Like I don't have to worry too much," he said.

As Ken continued to shelter in place, Ypsilanti Meals on Wheels provided him with toilet paper, deodorant, a face mask and a toothbrush and toothpaste. Those things would have taken a chunk out of his limited budget if purchased at the corner store – his only accessible shopping option. Meals and support from YMOW have allowed Ken to save some money for other necessities, and the food is better and healthier than anything he could prepare himself, Ken said.

Ken describes himself as a social person, so sheltering in place has been hard. He enjoys his walks to the corner to pick up a few necessities. But until it's safe to venture out, he's grateful to have food and other items delivered to his door by the friendly staff and volunteers of YMOW.

He also looks forward to his weekly chats with a YMOW volunteer. "I was in a very bad rut when the pandemic first hit," Ken said.

The weekly calls he receives from YMOW's Only a Ring Away program have helped to replace the human contact that he's missing.

"It gives me a lift," he said. And reminds him that while he continues to self-isolate for his own safety, YMOW is there to make it all a little easier.

Help comes in many forms as YMOW faces COVID-19

From the way we deliver meals to how we pay for them, everything changed in March 2020.

Knowing that our clients are among the most vulnerable and not knowing what the future would hold, YMOW took immediate steps to ensure that every client would have the food they need, no matter what the future held.

In the days following Michigan's first cases of COVID-19, every YMOW client received frozen, shelf-stable and liquid meals to provide food for three weeks.

By the end of March, YMOW and Michigan Medicine had pivoted to a new delivery schedule that would cut in half our need to visit their homes. Rather than six days a week, clients would receive meals on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays, with each delivery containing food for two days.

The YMOW staff was divided into two teams. While one team worked to deliver meals, the other sheltered at home, ensuring a healthy backup team should the first team become ill. Thanks to the generosity of local organizations and individuals, YMOW quickly equipped staff with PPE and initiated new protocols for delivering meals safely without client interaction. Staff would no longer enter clients' homes. After placing food at the door, client care associates would step back six feet, where they would

wait to confirm the delivery had been made.

Meanwhile, members of the YMOW team began searching for sources of funding that would see us through the uncertain months ahead. We successfully applied for dozens of grants and reached out to the public. From large corporations to local businesses and individual neighbors, people responded to the needs of their homebound neighbors with generosity and compassion.

Food continued to be delivered without interruption, but the smiles that clients looked forward to each day now were shared from behind masks and face shields. Greetings were cut short as clients and YMOW staff took extra care to stay apart and stay healthy.

In our ongoing commitment to deliver more than a meal to our homebound neighbors, YMOW staff and volunteers initiated a wellness call program in the weeks following the start of the pandemic. The Only a Ring Away program continues to provide every YMOW client with calls that assess their physical and mental well-being and their unmet needs while also helping to fight isolation with a friendly chat.

As people took steps to shelter in place, YMOW saw demand for service grow. Thanks to the generous donation of a van and money from Toyota Motors of North America, YMOW was able to eliminate its wait list for service in the midst of the pandemic. With additional support from the CARES Act, we will

eliminate the wait list for under-60 clients by the end of 2020.

"YMOW is proud to have provided uninterrupted service to Ypsilanti's homebound population throughout the COVID-19 pandemic. We could not have done it without the support of our community," said Executive Director Alison Foreman.
